So the early months of the year were consumed with proofreading, checking, correcting and tidying up the thesis. Soon after submitting the thesis at the end of March, Chris started work as centre manager of the Australian Centre for Christianity and Culture here in Canberra, a job she is thoroughly enjoying. In the two weeks

days of meetings with energetic students. He also did a bit of homework there with printers etc. as he will go back to Chiang Mai next March for the general assembly of the Christian Conference of Asia to do the daily newspaper. We came home via Perth for the Australasian Religious Press Association convention, and Chris was able to introduce Geoff to her old home and friends there.

While Chris has been kept busy with her new nine-to-five job, Geoff has been (reluctantly) adjusting to life as a house husband with only Jerry the cat for company. He made two visits to work for CCA in Hong Kong and a trip with his friend Simon to Shanghai, so he hasn't been completely housebound.

We walk up into the nature reserve near us each evening and often see the glossy black cockatoos that have made their home there, along with numerous other birds and the kangaroos. Jerry, though, is starting to age. He needs steps (literally) to get up on the bed now, and the vet tells us his kidneys aren't what they should be. But for 15, he's not doing too bad.

The two churches keep us pretty busy too. Chris is minister of the word, chair of parish council and rector's warden at Holy Cross, and Geoff is on the board at the Ainslie Church of Christ and often leads the worship and/or singing.

It's been a year of big birthday celebrations for family and friends—Alice Butterfield's 1st, Elizabeth Butterfield's 30th, David Bull's 50th, Robert Alves 60th, Auntie Meg's 80th, Gordon Stirling's 90th and, biggest of all, Marjorie Spooner's 100th—and we managed to get to almost all of them.

We are heading north for Christmas to spend some time with Chris's family and will base ourselves in Nambour.
